THE SUPPER IS FOR UNITY

From Pastor

Divisions created by rogue teachings and practices withing the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod continue to cause confusion and trouble the consciences of members. Those who truly value and cherish God's Word and doctrine are always troubled in conscience when presented with false teaching and practices. When we are told to capitulate to them or "show kindness toward the weaker brother" until they change their erroneous doctrines and practices in their churches, we are essentially being ordered to sear our conscience and overlook their inconsistencies. This is detrimental to faith and to the Church.

This problem rears its ugly head all-too-often in our Synod when it comes to the practice of the distribution of Holy Communion. Who is to receive the Sacrament? Why should or should a person not receive the Sacrament? What's the big deal if a person receiving the Sacrament is Lutheran or not if they believe the Words? (See the Explanation of the Lord's Supper in the Small Catechism for more questions and answers). Questions like these, which are attempts to bring unity, lead to disunity and division in heart and faith—a division trying to be masked and concealed to the eye by the outward reception of the Lord's Supper.

Faith in Christ saves. Thanks be to God believers in Jesus will be in heaven. Even despite erroneous doctrines believed in ignorance, faith in Christ units us with Christ and with one another.

But differences arise among Christians over what God's Word teaches. Thus, throughout history false teachings (and teachers) have crept into the Church. Led by sinful human reason and some by demonic influence, doctrines and practices have been taught that abscond from God's Word. These teachings divide the Christian Church. When St. Paul dealt with division in Corinth, he said in 1 Corinthians 11:18–19 that there must be factions among you so that those who are genuine can be recognized. The presence of error alerts us to the presence and necessity of confessing the truth. It is this truth, God's truth, we must cling to above all others, and thereby have unity with Christ, in the unity He creates with fellow believers.

This unity in Christ is shown most intimately in the Lord's Supper. Jesus unites us with Himself and one another in this sacramental eating of His body and His blood, in, with, and under the bread and wine, for our forgiveness, life, and salvation.

At the railing, in the Supper, we also testify to our unity in doctrine and teachings of Scripture. The Sacrament is not simply a personal, individual act. It is also an act of public confession. It testifies to our unity in the "teaching of the Apostles" (Acts 2:42).

When you receive the Sacrament at a church's altar, you are giving public testimony that you agree with that church's doctrinal position—and you should have the assurance (for the sake of your conscience and the sake of those yet unprepared to receive the Sacrament) that those communing around you agree as well. Holy Communion is the highest expression of church fellowship. We do this publicly with thousands of other LCMS congregations. At the same time, this practice shows other Christians (and even unbelievers) that there is no such thing as a "generic" Christianity. Sincerely believing the words of Jesus and God's Word, we should decline to serve Holy Communion to persons not of our church body—not because we think they are "bad people" or not Christians, but to protect those still abiding by error in doctrine so as to encourage them toward the truth.

When we encounter LCMS Congregations where the communion practice is to admit anyone who believes in Jesus, or share the Sacrament with any visiting Christian who is given or shown a list of questions and then informed, "if you believe this you may have the Lord's Supper", this does not express unity, but disunity. We must be on guard against such rogue teachings and practices that seep into our Church, and avoid them. This not only for confessional unity, but also for the sake of conscience—both of LCMS Lutherans, and Christians who remain "unworthy and unprepared" to receive the Sacrament, and to protect those who from receiving the Supper to their detriment and become guilty of Christ's body and blood.


"Closed communion is not meant to be a judgmental practice, in the sense that we are condemning people. It is a practice which preserves and upholds the truth and power of the Sacrament. It is a practice which we Lutherans feel protects those who do not believe the same things as we do. It is a practice which recognizes that a person's church membership does mean something. To belong to a church means to confess what that church believes and confesses. To commune at a church's altar is the highest expression of confessing oneness with what that church teaches."1 Christ Jesus is truly present in, with, and under the bread and wine to bring us unity with Him and with one another in the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation He bestows upon us in this Holy Sacrament.


